

How to GO for GOspel ONLINE

Last month I shared with you that to "Go" (Matthew 28:19-20) to make disciples in today's world meant going online. That is a call for us as a body, and certainly we have on online presence as a body, but maybe you are wondering how you as an individual can share the Gospel online?

As Christians in a digital world, we need to remember that our online posts are out there forever. When you post something that's public, even if it's deleted, it's very easy to take a screen shot of it. Greg Koukl, author of *Tactics*, is fond of discussing the "ambassador model" for sharing the Christian life. We must carry this idea with us online. The world will notice if your social media seem to carry messages that both glorify God and glorify the world at the same time.

While it's tempting to think that simply sharing a Scripture verse will cause others to read it and be blessed by it, the non-church-goer will probably pay more attention to how we interact with others and how our more general posts are geared. This means we must be Christ-like, even to our enemies or those people who seem to only reply or post to rile us up — commonly called "trolls." We know that this is the case for our daily life, but sometimes in the less personal online world, we forget that there are real people behind the usernames we see, and we must remember that they are watching and that we are "living Epistles" (2 Corinthians 3:2) that they are reading at all times.

The easiest way to support growing God's kingdom online is to show support for those who are already doing His work. For instance, our page and its posts, but not just ours, give reputable ministries like Dr. Heiser, or Stand To Reason, Maven, or others a "like" or "follow." Let's start with what you can do to help the church page, and then you can apply these same steps to other ministries that bless you.

If you are on Facebook, leave a recommendation for our page, "like" our posts, and share some of our content. That will help the word get out. We are also on Instagram, and while you can't share as easily, every "heart" matters. If you are on YouTube, subscribe, turn on notifications, and "like" our videos, even if you have already watched them when they streamed on Facebook or in person. Every interaction helps get the word out there.

If you enjoy our church, one of the best ways to help it reach new people is to google our church and leave a short, 5-star google review. This helps new families in the area see a church when they are seeking a new place to worship.

You can repeat these steps for other ministries you like, and if you have a Christian author you love; I can't stress how important Amazon reviews are. Many automatically search out and give negative reviews for books that promote Christianity, so your help is needed to support truth.

On an individual level, short mini-testimonies can have an amazing impact over time. Simply incorporating a thankfulness to God for the blessings in your life into your ordinary posts can provide a hook for others to see that

you are Christian and to think about the source of their blessings. A short shout-out about your daily reading or a beneficial Christian song can go a long way when united with consistently Christ-like behavior over time.

Times are changing, I hope you will join me in meeting people where they are by living the Christian life, both online and off.

Jorge is deaf and 20 years ago I started interpreting for him while home visiting my parents. He was at La Joya Middle School, in fact, our very own, Sue Geis was an aide in his class. One day on the soccer field after school, his mom and younger brothers came up to me. I introduced myself. As Jorge grew he got other interpreters and my life filled up with other things, but I stayed connected with his family. would give his brothers a ride to AWANA on Wednesday nights at church and Jorge would sometimes come to youth group or join us on a trip. Today, Jorge is 33 years old. He is currently suffering from a con-

dition known as dystonia, and last week, I walked him in his wheelchair down to Starbucks for a hang out. He often video messages me to chat and he has plans for us to go to Amigos soon.

I was just in awe of what God did with a seemingly mundane task of

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interpreting for a junior higher.


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We never know what God is doing. Organic Outreach, our operating system at the Fountain Church, is just this. Its sharing Jesus and having a heart for the lost and for God's people in the place where you are planted. We aren't responsible to share Jesus with a quota but to be Jesus to those around us and have an answer for this hope we have through what Jesus did for us on the cross. Its important we give attention to whatever is before us so that God can use us fully. Remember being used of God isn't just about reaching others but its also about God transforming us in the process.

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Why Two Services?

We recently switched times for our two services. As folks settle into new routines, a few have asked, "Why two services?" I thought that this would be a great time to refresh us on our strategy.

Just before the pandemic, we launched a second, contemporary service. This service was designed to meet the unchurched closer to where they are. I have followed polls by Barna, including large research projects like "Making Room for Millennials," as well as research by Thom Rainer and more mature pastors in Disciple Heritage Fellowship. I have also been interviewing, as best as possible, folks who visited our church and didn't land here. Their comments were consistent and lined up with what Barna, Rainer, and others have found.

One hundred years ago, it seemed like almost everyone went to church; only 50 years ago, it seemed to be that the vast majority did. Church greatly influenced culture, but church was also a culture unto itself. The music, the language, the traditions — all were passed down inside the church by lines of families who went to church together. Meanwhile, significant trends that really gained steam in the 60's saw an offshoot of people walk away from the church.

The unchurched developed their own culture, and the church largely didn't interact with them. As 60 or so years went by, the use of words, music styles, and traditions all diverged in ways far sharper than ever before in U.S. history. That meant that those who grew up in church and younger people who were more exposed to the world's culture — as well as those who had never been to church — communicated in vastly different ways.

Churches have noticed this trend for some time; hence, Maranatha Music's inception and the continued evolution of contemporary Christian music. Combine that with the digital age, and even the way churches are built has changed, as we seek to both "feed the sheep" (John 21:17) and "reach the lost" (Luke 15:3-7).

Young people and the unchurched largely want dark places of worship, so they aren't distracted by the crowds and can focus on hearing the message and the worship lyrics. They long for a more contemplative, yet casual, atmosphere and a more personal experience. They want music and rhythms that sounds familiar to them, like on the radio. In contrast, those who grew up with a church heritage value rich older hymns, the familiar songs they knew growing up and a bright atmosphere where they can see others worshipping as a communal event. They value tradition in a greater way than the young or unchurched. The two groups also don't usually like the preferences of the other.

Since it is hard to have a service both well lit, and dark featuring all classic songs or hymns, or all songs that would be familiar to young people, both full of tradition, and yet feel relevant, we decided two different services were necessary.


How is it working out? We have young people who weren't regular attenders just a year ago volunteering in our sound booth and singing on stage.

Having two different times has brought new people just for the time convenience. Having different worship options has relieved some of the stress of Chuck trying to play to two distinct audiences. We have seen new visitors and new regular attenders who prefer one or the other. In other words, it's helped us reach more people and given more opportunities for people to serve.

When Chuck suggested that we flip the services to better meet the needs of young parents, it was easy to relate as a young parent myself! So far, the change has worked out great for both worship teams, as well.

As we work on projects, like being able to close and open the curtains on our big windows — a function that it was originally intended to have — the two services will continue to look more distinct from one another. We will have the option of playing with the service order of the contemporary service more, while still providing something more traditional.

Despite the two services, we are still one church. Both hear the same message; both hear about the same small group and event opportunities to encourage mingling together; and both glorify God. This two-pronged approach allows us to be more diverse in our impact and is an important piece of the strategy of reaching younger and unchurched people in our community for Jesus.

Jesus broke my spirit so He can now have a good work in me. We shouldn't want anything to hinder our walk, this world has nothing to offer us. We so need to be careful not to be the church "as a whole" of being neither hot nor cold as many have become.

We need to stand together, in the truth of his word, be encouraged to stay the course and continue to stand, or be deceived, as we can all be, myself included and fall short of His Glory.
